



Officers Assaulted

The FBI's Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted Data Collection has collected aggregate assault data for more than 50 years. The following information concerns duly sworn federal, state, city, county, university and college, and tribal law enforcement officers who were assaulted in the line of duty in 2022. The law enforcement officers included in this report also met certain other criteria, which is listed on the Officer Criteria page.

This topic page discusses information about aggregate assault data.

Overview

- In 2022, the FBI collected assault data from 10,125 law enforcement agencies that employed 530,278 officers. (See Table 80.)
- Law enforcement agencies reported that 66,415 officers were assaulted while performing their duties in 2022. (See Table 80.)
- The rate of officer assaults in 2022 was 4.2 per 100 sworn officers. (See Table 80.)

Injuries

- Of the 66,415 officers who were assaulted, 22,063 (33.2 percent) sustained injuries. (Based on Table 80.)
- 36.3 percent of the officers who were attacked with personal weapons (e.g., hands, fists, or feet) suffered injuries. (See Table 85.)
- 19.1 percent of the officers who were assaulted with knives or other cutting instruments were injured. (See Table 85.)
- 11.4 percent of officers who were attacked with firearms were injured. (See Table 85.)

- 27.3 percent of officers who were attacked with other dangerous weapons were injured. (See Table 85.)

Times of incidents

- The largest percentage of assaults on officers (11.7 percent) happened from 8:01 p.m. to 10 p.m. (See Table 82.)
- 11.2 percent of assaults on officers occurred from 12:01 a.m. to 2 a.m. and also from 10:01 p.m. to midnight. (See Table 82.)
- The smallest percentage of assaults on officers (3.2 percent) occurred between 4:01 a.m. and 6 a.m. (See Table 82.)

Circumstances

Of all officers who were assaulted in 2022:

- 28.5 percent were responding to disturbance calls (family quarrels, bar fights, etc.). (Based on Table 83.)
- 18.2 percent were attempting other arrests. (Based on Table 83.)
- 13.6 percent were handling, transporting, or maintaining custody of prisoners. (Based on Table 83.)

Clearances

Law enforcement agencies may clear offenses by arrest or exceptional means (i.e., when they can identify the perpetrator but are unable to make an arrest due to circumstances beyond their control, such as the death or suicide of the subject).

- In 2022, law enforcement agencies cleared 84.9 percent of the 66,415 reported assaults on law enforcement officers. (See Table 83.)
- By type of circumstance, agencies cleared the greatest percentage of assaults (88.7 percent) on officers who were attempting other arrests. (See Table 83.)

- Agencies reported that they cleared 88.2 percent of the assaults on officers who were responding to burglaries in progress/pursuing burglary suspects. (See Table 83.)

Assignments

- 62.2 percent of the officers who were assaulted were assigned to 1-officer vehicle patrols. (Based on Table 84.)
- 14.8 percent of the officers who were assaulted were assigned to 2-officer vehicle patrols. (Based on Table 84.)
- 3.3 percent of officers who were assaulted were assigned to detective duties or special assignments. (Based on Table 84.)
- 19.7 percent of officers were assigned to other duties when they were assaulted in the line of duty. (Based on Table 84.)

Weapons

- In 2022, 76.2 percent of officers who were assaulted in the line of duty were attacked with personal weapons (e.g., hands, fists, or feet). (Based on Table 85.)
- 4.6 percent of the officers were assaulted with firearms. (Based on Table 85.)
- 2.1 percent of the officers were assaulted with knives or other cutting instruments. (Based on Table 85.)
- 17.0 percent of the officers were assaulted with other dangerous weapons. (Based on Table 85.)
